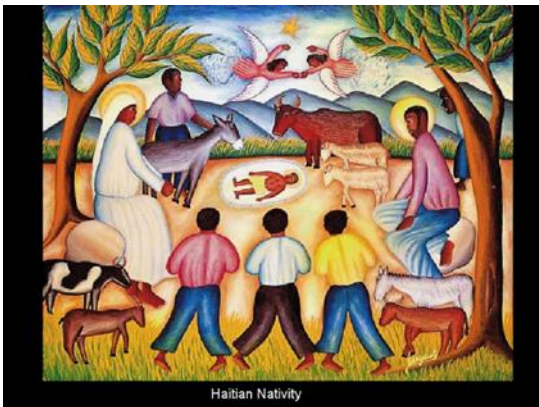


Worship at Home with Local Preacher Jenny Brooks for 3rd December 2023

Reflection

Advent is a time of reflection and preparation for the coming of Jesus as a human child; Christians call this incarnation.

So much of the world around us is pushing us towards Christmas, it can be difficult to separate Advent and Christmas. However, we all know how important preparation is in many aspects of life; sometimes the preparation can be more enjoyable than the special event. I remember as a teenager, sometimes getting ready to “go out” was more fun than the actual party or trip. We have just had a family wedding and some of the preparation was great fun and spread over a year! (The wedding was also lovely). Athletes prepare by training over long periods for races that sometimes are over in seconds. When we cook, we find ingredients from the back of the cupboard and the tools we need to chop, grate, whisk, mix before we begin to put everything together.

Preparation is what Jesus is talking about in the Gospel reading from Mark. Not that we literally have to stay awake, but we need to “be ready”, prepared for what might be asked of us in our journey with God.

Advent seems to require of us space to reflect on who Jesus is. The material being used by Northampton Methodist Church for Advent bible study is titled “Immanuel: God with us”. We will spend time with each other reflecting on what we understand about Jesus and what that means for our daily lives. This first week of Advent the theme is titled “chosen and anointed”. These are complex ideas from the Hebrew bible that speak of the choosing of kings and prophets, by God and a symbol of this choosing was anointing with oil. Some of this thinking applies to Jesus, as the incarnation of God and some of it applies to us, because we have a part to play in bringing ways of thinking, speaking and behaving, that reflect the nature of God to people around us. All of this takes time to understand and put into practice; we need to decide how we spend our time during Advent.
