Time to Reflect

For those of you who are drivers, you might be familiar with the sensation of driving down a road, missing a turning, and then having to do a U-turn. Sometimes turning round can be quite an effort. Yet it is necessary to ensure that you are heading in the right direction.

The beginning of this week's lectionary Gospel passage has Jesus following on from John the Baptist's ministry in which he proclaimed repentance, a turning around from sin and a reorientation of our hearts and minds towards God. John has been arrested, for being a holy troublemaker, but now Jesus comes to fulfil what John has been announcing.

As Jesus is walking along the shore of Galilee he comes across a number of fishermen: Simon, Andrew, James, and John. They were busy undertaking their usual tasks; fishing on the lake and mending their nets. Yet when Jesus calls them to follow him, they immediately leave their nets, boats, and families to go where he is leading them.

Mark's Gospel is fairly to the point here and we do not have much detail in the interaction between Jesus and the fisherman or between the sons and their father Zebedee. The text does not make it clear whether Jesus words came across like an authoritative command, a gentle invitation, or a rousing speech, yet they must have been sufficiently convincing for them to leave everything that they knew behind to take up a life of wandering with Jesus. Of course, whilst these were the first disciples there would be more; twelve apostles along with women such as Mary Magdalene. All of them make a radical decision to follow Jesus and leave their old lives behind for a new beginning with him.

As Christ's disciples living today, we are also called to a radical leaving behind to follow Jesus.

We are called to participate in his work of proclaiming the good news and seeing the world around us reshaped so that the Kingdom of God is experienced amongst us. This can involve difficult choices, yet the result is a community where the love of God is known, especially amongst those who need to know it the most: The poor, the vulnerable, and the dispossessed.

Therefore, as followers of Jesus, we commit ourselves to changing our direction and going where Christ leads us through the Holy Spirit. May we see ourselves and the world around us transformed by the love of God who in Christ lived, died, and was raised for all people.
