READING: Luke 20 v 27 - 38

Message:

I wonder if your heart sinks when someone starts a conversation with the words "You are religious, what do you think about..." Are we supposed to have all the answers? How do we answer? Do we please the people asking the questions or do we give the answer that will please God? It can be scary to stand up and be counted.

There are a lot of issues in our world today, issues that maybe we should be getting involved with, whether we are political animals or not! We are in the world to try to make a difference, and that doesn't happen if we all remain silent.

Jesus answered questions that ordinary people were asking and in a way that they could understand. I wonder how he would have answered questions about Fair Trade, Same-sex marriage, our Multi-faith, Multicultural society. Do you have answers ready if you are asked?

The Sadducees asked Jesus a question about a woman who had been married 7 times and what would happen after her death, who would be her husband then? It was obviously another trick question to trap Jesus into saying something that could be held against him. The Sadducees and the Pharisees worked together to try to discredit Jesus and stop people listening to him, although these two groups were miles apart in their beliefs.

The Pharisees were entirely a religious group, set on carrying out their ceremonial law. They had added thousands of regulations on top of all that was written down by the Prophets. The Pharisees believed in resurrection from the dead and in angels and spirits and they believed in fate and God having a plan for our lives, they also believed and hoped for the coming of the Messiah.

On the other hand, the Sadducees, few in number but all very wealthy and often in positions of authority, liked to keep on the right side of Rome – they didn't want to lose their position.

They accepted the written Law of Moses and didn't rate the other Prophets. They didn't believe in resurrection, angels or spirits – so their question was obviously to try to get Jesus to say something that would be considered wrong.

So the Sadducees were on one side, the Pharisees on the other and most ordinary people in the middle. As usual Jesus gave a good answer.

The woman had done nothing wrong as she had acted according to the Law of Moses - if a man died childless then his brother should marry his widow, this was binding according to the Sadducees – they didn't believe in resurrection so why did they think there would be a problem anyway?

Jesus pointed out that heaven is not just a continuation of life on earth. We mustn't think of heaven in terms of this earth, life there will be quite different. None of us knows what heaven will be like and it would save a lot of worry if we stopped speculating and just trusted in the love of God. And Jesus said that Moses (who the Sadducees believed in) had said at the burning bush that God is the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, and as it is impossible for God to be the God of the dead, they must all be alive and therefore there must be resurrection – even the scribes who were around, thought Jesus had given a good answer. Jesus met their question and answered it in a way that everyone could understand. He faced their issue with confidence.

Today there are still many issues, people will often look to see how Christians are responding to what is happening. We never know when we will be challenged to say what we think and we have to be like Jesus, he didn't shy away, he spoke out to change people and events. It may be easier to go with the flow rather than speak out.

Remember Ships are safe in the harbour, but that is not what they are intended for! We can hide away and be safe, but God intended us to be in the world changing people and events. If it makes life a bit stormy, we just have to remember that we are anchored to God's love and he will not let us be overwhelmed, we will be safe because he will give us the right words to speak. Let's be prepared to answer for our beliefs.
