Time to reflect:

In our Bible reading today we are reminded to 'be ready, walk in his paths and finally to keep watch, because you do not know on what day your Lord will come.'

Are we ready for Christmas? Many people have already started to make preparations for this Christmas.

My grandma would always say she started saving up for the next Christmas on Boxing Day!

How do I get ready and prepare for Christmas? In my late forties I started a new tradition of playing a Handel's Messiah CD in my car listening to it full volume. The opening words from Isaiah, Every valley shall be exalted and every mountain and hill made low; the crooked straight and the rough places plain, somehow the words and music helped me prepare for Christmas.

In the last three years I have been following the Celtic Christian tradition of advent readings starting on 15th November, forty days before Christmas, sometimes called the forgotten Lent. Often, we follow the forty days lent before Easter day where we celebrate the Death and resurrection of Jesus Christ the Saviour of the world but 40 days before Christmas reminds us of the importance of Jesus birth in the Christmas story.

One of my favourite carols is Hark the herald Angels sing, Hail the heaven-born Prince of Peace! Hail the Son of Righteousness! Light and life to all he brings, risen with healing in his wings. Mild he lays his glory by, born that we no more may die, born to raise us from the earth, born to give us second birth.

For me Christmas Day is so special when we can celebrate the birth of Jesus and the miracle of his birth as a miracle.

One line reads 'born to give us second birth' In just six words this Christmas message is for you and me, reminding us that there is a gift of eternal life in the here and now, giving us hope. At Christmas we receive Christmas presents however the most precious gift we can receive this Christmas is the gift of God's presence with us as we sing the Song Emmanuel, God with us inviting us to say thank you Lord for your gift of Jesus Christ my Lord and Saviour today.

As we close our first advent reflection here is a Christmas prayer you can say on Christmas day and the days leading up to it.

Heavenly Father, we thank you today for this food. We will enjoy it. We thank you also for the real meaning of Christmas – that you sent your Son to be the Saviour of the World – our Saviour. We accept both this food, and the gift of Your Son, with grateful hearts. Amen

Finally, may we 'be ready to walk in his paths and to keep watch, because you do not know on what day your Lord will come.' This Christmas may we receive the greatest gift of his presence with us both in the here and now and for all eternity.
