

## For everything, a time

### Ecclesiastes 3.1-13

The writer poetically pairs together 14 sets of contrasting actions (birth and death, planting and pulling up, and so on...), proclaiming that God has set the right time for everything. Their conclusion is that while we can never fully understand what God has done, we can enjoy the gifts of God for as long as we live.

Now read **Ecclesiastes 3.1-13** see p.2 for text.

### A note on the passage

By indicating that there is a right time or season for everything, we are prompted to think about our lives now. What is it time to do now? By encompassing the full spectrum of joy and sadness, we are reminded to consider other people's experiences and challenges.

# REFLECT

Find something in your house which can be built into a tower (blocks, marshmallows, coins... anything will do!). Look back over the past year and towards the year ahead. Build a tower. As you add each object, name something you would like God to help you build up, grow or develop. Tear it down again. As you remove each object, name something you would like God to help you tear down or let go of.



Why is it important to do the right thing at the right time?







Listen to this passage set to music by Lynsey Martin Kimmitt (https:// www.youtube.com/watch?v=LLBybveXCfE). Think of what lies ahead for 2023 - what uncertainties, excitements or changes lie ahead? Reflect on the repeated line 'God will be with us all' and think about how that makes you feel. If you have a 2023 calendar or diary, select a few pages at random, and write or draw on them a reminder that God is with us in all times.





Follow a recipe (e.g. https://www.bbc.co.uk/food/ recipes/scones\_1285) to bake some scones. As you complete each stage, think about the importance of taking the right time over it. From weighing the ingredients, to rubbing in the butter and kneading the dough, to baking in the oven, scones only work if the right time is taken. Discuss ways we can ask God to help judge the right time for everything in our lives.

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Set an alarm or reminder on a phone or alarm clock to go off at the same time each day this week. When the alarm goes off, stop, and consider whatever you are doing in that moment. What is this the right time for? Where is God in this moment?



Look again at the passage on page 2. There are 28 statements beginning "a time to..." Which ones might help someone in your community? Choose one of these helpful things and carry out the action this week. For example, perhaps you could weed someone's garden, share your skills in sewing, dancing or speaking, or think of someone who would appreciate a hug.
