Reflecting on the Book of Micah 6: 1-8

Micah prophecies are addressed to rulers and priests in Jerusalem and Samaria as the prophet declares in the following verse.

“The city’s rulers govern for bribes, the priests interpret the Law for pay, the prophets give their revelations for money—and they all claim that the Lord is with them. “No harm will come to us,” they say. “The Lord is with us.” (Micah 3:11).

In this text, Micah presents his prophetic observation of violence and injustice in the Judean society during the 8th C. He paints to his readers, a picture of spiritual manipulations, abuse of ministerial gifts, political oppression and economic exploitation by the powerful privileged class against the weak and oppressed (6:12), do you think if Micah was preaching to us in our current context today, do you think his prophetic preaching would be of relevance in our present society?

In this passage, the prophet Micah implores that Israel openly demonstrated poverty of spirituality and tired of God, thus chosen to go its own way at any cost, putting efforts in worship that seem not to correspond to the expectation of Yahweh. Prophet Micah’s courage would not withstand such a messy and mockery of God. We should note keenly that the Prophet Micah held special convictions and courage, a person of a rare personal faith under such irreligious circumstances. The following verses in Micah Chapter six, our focus today, declares.

*“ 6 Wherewith shall I come before the Lord,
and bow myself before the high God?
Shall I come before him with burnt offerings,
with calves of a year old?*

*7 Will the Lord be pleased with thousands of rams, or with ten thousand of rivers of oil?
Shall I give my firstborn for my transgression,
the fruit of my body for the sin of my soul?
8 He hath shewed thee, O man, what is good;
and what doth the Lord require of thee, but to
do justly, and to love mercy, and to walk
humbly with thy God? "*

The task for the Prophet was to invite the people of Israel to restore and reconcile the broken relationship with God and with their neighbours.

Some people want to imagine that God has abandoned them and mistreated them. They use this to justify their ungodly lifestyle. While others are quite honest with themselves and take the responsibility for their existing poor relationship with God. People quite often, when they encounter trials and problems in life, there are always temptation to want to question God's involvement. They feel that God has been unfaithful and unkind, and as such they are under no obligation to serve Him.

Can you identify any form of violence and injustice in your own context? Does your mission/ministry reflect Micah's question, "What does God expect of you?" in the transformation of the world reflecting in your own contexts?

Prayers of intercession.

Fill us with the reflections of your character, help us to extend mercy, to show love, to walk humbly, to act in ways that are just and right in this world. Help us to hear your voice, May the Holy Spirit, be upon me to see things as you see them, to truly reflect the character of Christ in our daily lives. Empower me to be salt and light in a mysterious world. May we choose to see others as more important than ourselves? May we long to help serve those who have suffered so greatly and to be a voice for those who have been oppressed or silenced. May we choose to love mercy, to show kindness, to a world that would seek to build walls and barriers instead of bridges and unity? May we choose to walk in humility with you, instead of looking out for ourselves first.

We ask that you unite believers everywhere to pray for our nation and world, that you would help us to set aside our differences and focus on the bond in you that holds us all together, as there is a great power in how we choose to live our lives. Shine on us Lord, bless us with your peace and presence. Even when surrounded by the hardest of irreconcilable hearts. We are yielded to you, and choose to do justice, to love mercy, to walk humbly with you all the days of our lives. Amen.
